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Buildwas Rocks:

This week in **Willow class** we have continued to look at animals from the jungle. We started the week off discussing different job roles that use technology and what technology was. The children then had a go at drawing their own jungle animal using the iPad or big board. They thought this was amazing. We then used our artistic skills to make Toucans thinking about colour and how we could attach the different parts together. We have continued to focus on the story 'Rumble in the jungle', even having a go at writing our own sentences! In maths we have been consolidating what we have learnt this term focusing on patterns, zero and making 5. Preschool have focused on the story of 'Goldilocks and the three bears' and have looked at capacity, focusing on the language empty and full. This weeks Makaton sign is 'Cheese', we found this a very funny one to learn which also brought in the discussion about whether we like cheese or not. Finally we enjoyed a session up at forest school making bird feeders and discussing the signs of spring.

Beech Class have been VERY busy this week. Every single member of Beech Class has tried super hard during assessment week, we have shown amazing resilience and determination to complete some very tricky reading, maths, and phonics quizzes. Miss Lockley is incredibly proud of us all! We have also done some fantastic writing in Geography this week. We worked well as a team to create some brilliant ideas to describe what it is like in Antarctica, the rainforests, and hot deserts. Then in our books we wrote some even more amazing sentences describing these places! Beech Class have also been quite the artists this week. We've learned about primary and secondary colours and have created some FANTASTIC pieces of art using these colours!

The **Oak class** teachers are overly impressed with the children's hard work on several assessments this week. They focused for long periods of time, working with independence and concentration.

Oak class also excelled themselves at the MAD event at William Brookes on Wednesday afternoon. They spent two hours playing either tri golf, Boccia, or Curling against children from many different schools. We were especially pleased to see how welcoming the children were when some children from other schools had to join our teams.

We have started a new book in English and are trialling a new way of teaching it. In our first lesson we had to predict the setting, plot, and main character of our new book from a bag full of clues and a piece of music that conveyed the mood of the setting. We are looking forwards to finding out whether we are correct and seeing if the author's storyline is as exciting as our own ideas!

In **Holly class** this week, our highlight has been planning our final design for D&T. We are making mechanical animals next week, using cams and followers. Our designs are inspired by endangered animals and hope to raise awareness of these incredible species. In geography we have been learning about the negative impacts of deforestation. This has inspired a few of the children in the class to spread the word – STOP DEFORESTATION! Otherwise, this week has been assessment week and all of Holly class have been exceptional! We would also like to mention how many people have had silver stars this week for outstanding schoolwork – well done all!









